Why would we ask you to leave your personal concerns and use up some of your years doing army work that can be done by volunteers, people who serve in the army as a profession? Is this draft really necessary? After all, we already have enough men to fight the wars we are currently waging. You will say, there is already a volunteer military more than capable of protecting our country. But how long shall we have this volunteer military, I ask you? If the next generation is alienated from the important work and the necessary sacrifice needed to protect our country, our volunteer military will become smaller. Eventually, there won't be enough volunteers because no one will be able to see what we need a military for. After all, we are safe from all catastrophe.

But we are not safe, in fact, far from it! Therefore, we should not deceive ourselves on the nature of our security. Therefore, the public needs to be educated on the nature of the protection provided for them. What other way to do so than to place a reasonable percentage of the people in such a position as to be fully knowledgeable?

But why is it required? Because people do not like war. During past drafts, there were always people who actively avoided the draft. Some got permission from their doctors saying they were unable to serve during the draft, when they were in reality perfectly capable of doing so. Whether your loved ones die on foreign soil or peacefully in old age, they will be respected by all who call this country home.

Many of you are likely concerned that your family members are given no choice in this matter, and that they are being forced into a position they do not want to be in. But each individual can choose how he serves, and for how long. Depending on his age, he may even have multiple choices about when to serve, being this year or the next, or at a later time.

I know that at the beginning of my speech, some of you did not believe this policy was necessary or even beneficial. I sincerely hope that many of you now see it is necessary for nurturing a wise, educated public. By intentionally placing the next generation into an environment which will teach them how to be wise, morally sound leaders, they will become educated, informed citizens.
